From the President's Shop:



EAA 225 was invited to cook for the four hour event. We served over 70 sausage with pepper and onion subs to the crowd and met lots of future Young Eagles and their families. Peter Bruckner, Drew Gillett and Ken Ortmann flew Young Eagle flights and were busy all day. Due to insurance requirements this event was not a Young Eagles Rally but we hope to correct that for next year. It brought a lot of people out to the airport that we don't normally see which was fantastic. Kudos to Tracy Hayes, the Rochester Police Department, Bambi Miller and the good folks at Aero Works. Between this event and our two earlier Young Eagle rallies, we have raised about 600 dollars towards our 2013 Flight Scholarship.

August also brought two 'new' airplanes into the EAA 225 livery. Unfortunately past EAA 225 member, Richard Gilchrist, passed away on May 31, 2012. HIs widow, Alice Gilchrist, also a pilot and EAA member, called me and asked about donating two projects to the chapter. We headed over to Northwood to look at the projects and found a treasure trove of aviation projects, airplanes and information. Dick was an avid model builder and collector of aviation literature. He also embarked on a journey of building a KR-1 in 1974. He progressed quite far with the fuselage, wings, tail surfaces and retractable landing gear built. The workmanship is impressive. Dick was also a trained machinist and it shows in the precision of the wood joints on the KR-1. Also donated

to the chapter by Alice was a Mitchell Flying Wing A number of the ultralight chapter members know quite well what this aircraft is as they had one at the Yankee Ultralight Fly-In in Greenland this year.

Both projects are available for

purchase from the chapter. The workmanship and quality materials in these projects make them a great choice for someone that would want one of these efficient aircraft. Neither aircraft presently has an engine but the KR-1 only requires a 60hp
