AVIATION HISTORY LANDS AT MANCHESTER-BOSTON REGIONAL AIRPORT

The "Wings of Freedom Tour" has two goals: to honor the sacrifices made by our veterans that allow us

to enjoy our freedom; and to educate the visitors, especially younger Americans, about our national history and heritage. The Foundation encourages people to tour the planes, talk to the veterans who come to visit the aircraft, and participate in a "flight experience". In twenty-one years, the tour has made more than 2,378 visits to airports across the United States.

While the exact number of visitors is difficult to gauge, it is estimated that between 3 and 4 million people see these war birds annually.

The Collings Foundation's 1944 vintage Consolidated B-24J Liberator is painted as "Witchcraft", in honor of an 8th AF bomber that flew a record 130 missions over Europe as part of the 467th BG. The Boeing B-17G Flying Fortress flies as "Nine-O-Nine", in honor of an 8th Air Force, 91st BG heavy bomber. The B-17

was the companion of the B-24 in thousands of wartime, bombing, and reconnaissance missions. Together they were the backbone of the daylight strategic bombing campaign of WWII. The Foundation's P-51C was named "Betty Jane" to honor Col. Charles M. McCorkle, P-51 pilot who was an "ace" fighter pilot and commander, with 11 confirmed kills under his belt – 6 of them in a P-51 Mustang named "Betty Jane". "Betty Jane" has joined the tour as a representative of the "little friends" that engaged the German fighters as the huge bomber formations flew toward enemy targets, saving countless bomber crew lives.

Jack Ferns Stepping

Down



The Aviation Museum of New Hampshire has announced that Executive Director Jack Ferns stepped down from his post at the end of August.

Ferns is the first person to have directed the activities of the museum and he spearheaded the effort to obtain and move the original 1937 Manchester airport terminal building across the field to its present location. The beautifully restored art deco structure is now home to New Hampshire's aviation museum.

In addition to the original terminal structure, under the leadership of Jack Ferns, the Slusser Aviation Learning Center was added to the museum in 2011. This addition provided the space needed for both interactive exhibits and for many of the on-going educational activities that take place there.

Jack Ferns championed the Aviation Education program offered at the museum whereby high school juniors and seniors come to the museum and take courses that give them an in-depth understanding of the many careers available in modern aviation.

"The Av Ed program is how we touch the future of aviation ... by inspiring the next generation of aviation industry leaders," said Ferns. "The sky may be the limit, but the Av Ed program shows these kids that it is a limitless sky."

"Jack Ferns has had a tremendous influence on the development of both the NH Aviation Historical Society and the aviation museum," said NHAHS President Scott Stimpert. "Jack leaves behind a legacy of positive and progressive change, and the entire aviation industry in the Granite State will long-remember the great contributions that he has made." **

The Aviation Museum of New Hampshire will open its doors free of charge on Saturday September 28, 2013, as part of Smithsonian magazine's ninth annual Museum Day Live! nationwide event, Museum Day Live! offers free admission to visitors at a participating museum or cultural institution to emulate the admission policy of the Smithsonian museums in Washington D.C. Last year's event drew over 400,000 participants nationwide, and this year's event expects record-high participation. Included that day will be a special event on "home-built" aircraft. Homebuilt, amateur built, or experimental aircraft all refer to aircraft that are constructed from scratch or kits by aviation enthusiasts using their own abilities and craftsmanship to construct safe and efficient flying machines. The official name in the US is "Experimental Amateur -Built Aircraft". The total number of registered home-builts is nearly 33,000 in the U.S. alone, plus several thousand more internationally.

Visitors will learn what it takes to construct and fly an amateur-built aircraft, see state of the art technology that goes into these aircraft, and get hands-on experience with riveting and other construction techniques. They will see finished aircraft on display and be amazed at the sophistication and capability of these aircraft. This is a chance to see an aspect of aviation that few even know exists! *



World War II veteran John Katsaros of Haverhill, MA will be on hand to recount his heroic experiences after bailing out of his crippled B-17. John was captured by the Gestapo and managed to escape his captors. He joined up with the French underground and, with their assistance, managed to escape back to England via a perilous route. John's story is one of courage and of luck, and his personal recounting of events will keep listeners glued to their seats. He will also be on hand to personally sign his book Code Burgundy-The Long Escape.

Regular museum admission permits visitors to attend, and society members are welcome at no extra charge.
